


Photo By Rosanne Berkenstock County historian Bob Barron and architectural surveyor Cynthia MacLeod on Culpeper

Survey Provides Clues To Fauquier's Past

How many times have you driven over Fauquier County's roads and found yourself asking, "I wonder what that old building over there used to be?" Or driven by a wellkept but obviously old house and wondered who built it and when?

After the research currently being conducted by Cynthia MacLeod and Bob Barron is completed, the answers to many of these vague questions may well be readily available. They are conducting an architectural survey of the old and unique buildings of Fauquier County.

MacLeod, a graduate of Duke University, says she has always been interested in architectural history. After a year away from school, which included time spent working as a carpenter to discover how buildings were put together, she entered graduate school at the University of Virginia to pursue a master's degree in architectural history. She completed her course work last year, and in September began working in Fauquier County.

Although she was hired by the Virginia Historic Landmarks Commission in Richmond, MacLeod

Annual Meeting

Members of the Fauquier sound narrative which has been Historical Society met June 20 at St. installed upstairs in the Old Gaol James Parish Hall, Warrenton, for Museum. the society's annual membership meeting.

Committee reports and the election of a new treasurer and eight members of the board of directors provided the bulk of the business at the meeting. New or reelected directors are: Mrs. Robert K. Neilson, Col. David Rumbaugh, Douglas Smith, Mrs. Wade Stinson, Mrs. Charles Turner, Dr. Robert Anderson. Mrs. Ronald Berkenstock, and H. P. Monroe.

John Adams will continue as president of the society, with Marshall Wallach as vice president, and Mrs. John Lainhart as secretary. Mrs. Meade Palmer was elected treasurer.

William Parkinson, who guided the restoration of the Old Gaol into present museum, background information on the restoration. He explained the changes made and restorations done, and mentioned some of the fine articles that are on exhibition

Members learned of plans for a bi-monthly newsletter from Rosanne Berkenstock. She briefly explained some of the types of material the newsletter would contain, and its expected format.

Parkinson told the group of a recent meeting he had attended at which officers at Vint Hill Farms had expressed an interest in the history of their Army post. Vint Hill has already prepared a historic study of the post, and the Society decided to offer its assistance in their work.

Architectural historian Cynthia MacLeod and county historian Bob Barron told the society a little about the work they are doing surveying the buildings of Fauquier County. After their research is finished, they hope to publish a book which will provide information on many of the buildings they have visited.

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is actually paid by a grant administered by the Rappahannock-Rapidan Planning District Commission. While most of her time is spent in Fauguier County, she also occasionally researches and surveys buildings in other areas of the planning district.

Barron, on the other hand, is a native of Fauquier County. He delights in pointing out that he was "born right on the main street" of Warrenton at the old Physician's Hospital, now the District Nursing Home. He grew up with a love of

local history, and eventually earned a degree in history from Mary Washington College. Research on the old gold mines of Fauquier led to his publication of a booklet on gold mining.

Funds for Barron's current position were obtained from a special donor in Fauquier County. He is employed by the county as part of the Parks and Recreation Department, and began his work in January. In his job as county historian, Barron assists MacLeod with her surveys and researches many of the old buildings using tax records, deeds, wills, and any other factual information he can find.

Cindy and Bob keep track of all the houses surveyed so far by marking them on topographical maps. Sometimes they survey a house together, or more frequently she does the actual on-site work while he spends his time researching at the record room or library.

MacLeod will first ask the owner or residents of each house what they know of its history. She photographs the outside from several vantage points, and also takes pictures of any distinctive features on the inside. She measures its dimensions and sketches a floor plan, as well as examining the construction. The type and make of nails, saw marks, construction of rafters, framing methods, style and construction of doors and paneling all provide clues to the age of a particular building. She also looks for evidence of fine craftsmanship such as beading on paneling or carved mantels, but also does not overlook houses of more simple construction that are equally as old.

Cindy will note the additions and changes made in each house, and any outbuildings or cemeteries on the property. When her survey is finished, she will complete an inventory form, identify the photos, and mark the negatives which will be filed at the Virginia State Library in Richmond.

Not all of the buildings she visits will be researched by Barron. Only those they consider especially important or those that they have questions on will warrant having extra time spent on more extensive research.

MacLeod estimates that she has surveyed 450 buildings since she began her job. Other buildings, such as those in the Town of Warrenton, in Upperville, and many near Markham have already been briefly

surveyed in past years.

At the end of the project, MacLeod estimates that about 1000 buildings will have been inventoried. They include all pre-Civil War structures and any of noteworthiness built since that time. As many as possible will be included in a book they hope to compile.

READER'S CORNER

Like To Read? Start With Local History

Do you have some youngsters in the house who are getting bored with summer activities? Perhaps your grandchildren are visiting for a few weeks. For a change of pace, now might be a good time to introduce them to a little local history.

An excellent way to start off is a trip to the Old Gaol Museum. After spending some time browsing there, walk across the street to the Fauquier County Public Library. The library has in its Virginiana Room a very good collection of Fauquier County histories, maps, pictures and other items to tempt a youngster's interest in history.

Downstairs, in the children's section, are several good biographies on some famous Fauquier Countians. John Marshall by Teri Martini and John Marshall: Boy of Young America by Helen Albee Monsell are just two about our famous Chief Justice of the United States, John Marshall.

The Violent Years by Patricia Kahn is the story of Simon Kenton, a little known hero of frontier settlement, who was born near The Plains. He left Fauquier County at the age of 15. It was not long before he became a scout and aide to a very famous American frontiersman, Daniel Boone.

A well known person from the Civil War era was Colonel John S. Mosby. Although he was not born in Fauquier County, many of his escapades during the War were on Fauquier soil. After the end of the War he settled in Warrenton and opened a law practice. One particularly good juvenile biography of his life is by Anne Welsh Guy entitled John Mosby.

History Journal Makes Debut

Through the efforts of Dr. Peter Henriques, assistant professor of state and local history at George Mason University, a new journal focusing on the historical richness of the Northern Virginia area has recently made its debut.

Northern Virginia Heritage will appear three times a year-February, June and October.

Among the articles in the June issue is one on Edward Carter Turner of Kinloch at The Plains. The article contains many excerpts from Turner's Civil War diary, as well as an overview by Henriques which ties Turner's passages together.
